Support for Curtailing "Bad Operators" among Ocean Drive's Sidewalk Cafes R5-P

Executive summary:

The abuses of "bad operators" on Ocean Drive are negatively impacting residents' quality of life and the City's brand as a welcoming tourist destination. This ordinance proposes solutions to end those abuses.

Why It Matters

• Visitors who have unpleasant experiences at the hands of these bad operators have access to powerful word-of-mouth social media tools which can, if the situation is not rectified, harm the City's economy and global reputation.

MBU has passed a resolution which **supports and urges** the City of Miami Beach to **a dd more "teeth"** to this proposed ordinance in order to maximize its efficacy.

Support for Limiting the HPB/DRP Approval Power for Digital Supergraphics R5-H

Executive summary:

In 2016, the City Commission adopted an Ordinance amendment that reorganized and revised the signage section of the City Code to comply with recent US Supreme Court precedent. Prior to that, projected or illuminated still/changing images were not allowed in the City. Since the City Code was amended to allow electronic super graphics, only one project, located on Alton Road, has received approval from the Design Review Board for the construction of an illuminated supergraphic, it is larger than 90 feet by 37 feet.

Why It Matters

- It is critical that oversized and inappropriate moving image and/or illuminated graphics must not overwhelm the character of the City's neighborhoods
- The HPB and DRB authority to approve such signage must be curtailed.

MBU has passed a resolution which **supports** the City of Miami Beach's proposed changes.

Opposition to Digital Kiosks R7-K

Executive summary:

The City currently has ten static informational directories on Lincoln Road. The contract expired and is currently month-to-month; on January 11, 2017, the Mayor and City Commission approved the issuance of Request for Proposals for Interactive Digital Media Kiosks. The concern is that these kiosks will not just update those on Lincoln Road, but will also be installed in the public right-of-way, principally located on sidewalks and other public areas at various locations in the City.

Why It Matters

- The proposed kiosks will make a significant negative impact on the city's public spaces and there are minimal public benefits for installing kiosks throughout the city. People have a multitude of information choices via smart phones, which do not inflict clutter and blight in the city's public spaces.
- Digital kiosks will denigrate the ambiance of the city's commercial areas in which the city prides itself: its beautiful landscapes and the unique natural environment.
- The kiosks may not comply with strong Miami-Dade County sign laws that govern the Rights of Way.
- In a Miami Beach United survey, conducted on July 12, 2017, of 327 respondents, 207 were opposed to digital kiosks; 53 were undecided, and only 67 were in favor of "the installation of interactive digital kiosks in Miami Beach."
- As indicated in the Letter to Commission on the subject, "Polling conducted by the City indicated "Negative public opinion. To gauge the public's opinion of the kiosk units, a public survey was conducted by the Communications Department via Google Surveys rating the following: user-friendliness; technology and touch screen capabilities; and, preference of which one would fit best throughout the City. A total of 76 responses were received. Overall, most respondents reported a negative experience or opinion regarding the kiosks. The general sentiment of those responding was that the kiosks were not appropriate for Miami Beach, and would not positively impact public spaces."

MBU has passed a resolution which **opposes** digital kiosks as information sources for tourists and residents.

Oppositon to Changes to the Current Conditional Use Permit R5-G

Miami Beach United continues to **oppose** any changes to the existing ordinance governing the Conditional Use Permit appeal process. These changes would limit the ability of homeowners to protect themselves against excessive commercial intrusion.
